# Why It Is Important To Have A Heart To Serve:

In my twenty years in the indoor environmental remediation, assessment, and consultation industry, I have worked for people who had a lot of potential that was never realized. One person, in particular, was running a small business in a small city, performing work equaling nearly \$4 million dollars annually; however, there were several things being neglected and clients were taking notice. Through out the city people would say to me, "You don't work for . . . Do you?" (I would just smile and take note. I did not want to work somewhere with that kind of reputation, and was making plans on

moving.) Now, it doesn't take a rocket scientist to understand that this kind of public view

deteriorates the successes of the past, leaving the future questionable: Will that \$4 million per year be there next year? Will the community continue to call upon the company's services or will the business just erode?

The problem, at this company, was the owner and management took their success for granted, towering themselves over others as if elite to the world around them. They believed that their service



was so important that the community could not live without them, so it didn't matter what the community thought about their atti-

tudes - the community would mind themselves!

I disagree; in fact, I founded my business, SO-LUTIONS Indoor Environmental Consulting, on four main principles that I sensed were essential for successful service and successful business growth. One of these principles directly addresses what we are talking about in this story: Having a Heart to Serve Others!

## Is Jason Yost an Industrial Hygienist?

According to the Occupational Safety and Health Administration (OSHA) industrial hygiene "is the science of anticipating, recognizing, evaluating, and controlling workplace conditions that may cause workers' injury or illness. Industrial hygienists use

environmental monitoring and analytical methods to detect the extent of worker exposure and employ engineering, work practice controls, and other methods to control potential health hazards."

OSHA, again, states

that "under the [OSHA] Act, OSHA develops and sets mandatory occupational safety and health requirements applicable to the more than 6 million workplaces in the U.S.

### Is Jason Yost an Industrial Hygienist?

OSHA relies on, among many others, industrial hygienists to evaluate jobs for potential health hazards. Developing and setting mandatory occupational safety and health standards involves determining the extent of employee exposure to hazards and deciding what is needed to control these hazards, thereby protecting the workers."

As a result of growing influence by OSHA and the EPA on restoration, remediation and general contracting work, I often get asked, "Jason, are you an industrial hygienist?" I thought that I would share my answer with everyone.

I do not go around calling myself an industrial hygienist because I have worked so hard to earn advanced accreditation and certifications, but I am an industrial hygienist. Having attended school at Columbia Southern University, I completed a degree program in Industrial Hygiene Management and have since moved onto a second degree program in Occupational Safety and Health (meaning I am further educated in safety and health beyond just industrial hygiene).

Industrial hygiene "is the science of anticipating, recognizing, evaluating and controlling workplace conditions that may cause worker's injury or illness".

Some people might ask, if you have that kind of education, why don't you mention it? There are several reasons for this:

Firstly, the term Industrial Hygienist does not necessarily mean that the person using that title has any third-party accreditation, award or certification. As the American Board of Industrial Hygiene points out: "Traditionally, since the term 'industrial hygienist' has not been restricted by law, anyone who feels they have some capability to act in the realm of advising on the health and well-being of workers could label themselves as an Industrial Hygienist. They may be newly installed in an organizational position calling for such knowledge, therefore, by default, they become an Industrial Hygienist." For me, I wanted to convey something with more substance than this to those whom would be looking at me for help.

Secondly, the act of an Industrial Hygienist is to advise "on the health and well-being of workers". The ABIH further defines Industrial Hygienists as those with "technical knowledge" of occupational and industrial settings, specifically put:
